



## ASEAN-India: Towards Comprehensive Strategic Partnership

India hosted a special India-ASEAN Foreign Ministers' meeting in New Delhi in mid-June, 2022. This meet was seen as a step forward towards a comprehensive strategic partnership between India and ASEAN. This year marks the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of dialogue relations between the two. Both sides reaffirmed that openness, inclusiveness, rules-based order, freedom of navigation and peaceful settlement of disputes should be at the very core of the Indo-Pacific. Energy, food security, post-pandemic recovery, water security, blue economy, education, capacity building and trade were some of the major issues discussed during the meet.
