QUAD Summit on G7 sidelines

Hiroshima, Japan hosts the G7 Summit from May 19-21 2023. Other than common economic agenda, they addressed political and global challenges such as climate change, terrorism, and peace and security. On the sidelines of the G7 summit, the third in-person QUAD Leaders' Meeting also took place. It evolved around nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation among, other strategic issues.
