



## India's Presidency of the United Nations Security Council (UNSC)

18 August - 11 September 2021

India's first stint as the President of the UNSC since it became a non-permanent member of the Council for the 2021-22 term was most eventful. Under India's Presidency, the UNSC held discussions on important global issues and passed resolutions relating to UN peacekeeping operations and the situations in Mali, the Middle East, Somalia and Afghanistan. The landmark Presidential statement on maritime safety and security as a key component of the maintenance of international peace and security was a major highlight. India will next take over the mantle of UNSC President in December 2022.
