



G20 Bali Summit: Recover Together, Recover Stronger

The seventeenth meeting of the Group of Twenty (G20) nations was held in Nusa Dua, Bali, Indonesia on 15-16 November 2022. G20 leaders met for a two-day pinnacle summit hosted by the Indonesian G20 presidency under the theme, ‘Recover Together, Recover Stronger’. The group was formed in 1999 for resolving the global economic and financial crisis that had engulfed the world during the last decade of the 20th century. The summit saw extensive discussions on the revival of the global economy, food security, climate change and condemnation of Russian aggression among other high-priority agendas. | <p>Key takeaways from the G20 summit in Bali Reuters November 16, 2022</p> | <p>The summit was preceded by a bilateral meeting between US President Joe Biden and Chinese leader Xi Jinping, the first time the two had met since Biden became president. Perhaps the most concrete outcome was that US Secretary of State Antony Blinken now plans to visit to China early next year, the highest-level US visit to China in more than four years. Biden and Xi Jinping agreed to resume cooperation on climate change.</p> |

She spoke at the annual G20 Heads of State and Government Summit which took place in Bali, Indonesia, on 15-16 November. The Director-General told G20 leaders that it was important that poor, debt-distress countries be supported through more open trade and increased output.</p> |
